In one of his books, Manda Tchebwa described the DRC as "the land of song". We agree with him, and believe that music can be seen as one of the country's underestimated 'gold mines', as well as an instrument for socio-artistic work with young people.

Lukas Pairon founded the SIMM¹ international research platform which, since 2017, has focused on developing research on social and community music programmes, in order to better understand the role that musical practice can play in social work. He is himself particularly active in Gaza (Palestine) and Kinshasa (DR Congo) with the organisation Music Fund². And since September 2022 he is professor and founder of the Jonet Chair and its CESAMM centre³, which focuses on accompanying research on the practice of music in social programmes and also offers support and training for practitioners (musicians and social workers) wishing to engage themselves in such projects. Thanks to the support of the Foundation Inspiratum of Koen Kessels and Axel Vervoordt⁴, of la Banda da Musica⁵ and the Compagnie Sucrière⁶, it was possible to launch the project 'Kinshasa Social & Musical, in 2024 and 2025:

1. 'Saved by Music, They Say' - the book

From 2012 to 2016, Lukas Pairon carried out fieldwork in Kinshasa for his doctoral research on the social impact of music on street children (known as 'witch-children' or 'sheghes') and members of violent gangs (known as 'kulunas')⁷. He defended his doctoral thesis in June 2019 at Ghent University (Faculty of Political and Social Sciences). Following his doctorate, Lukas Pairon has written a book (in English) to share with practitioners (musicians and social workers) and researchers interested in discovering what we can learn from this study of music projects in social work in Kinshasa. Thanks to these projects, young people have become musicians. They say they are "saved by music" (the title of the book).

The preface to this book was written by <u>John Sloboda</u>⁸. The book was published in 2020 by <u>Routledge New York</u>. The Fondation Futur 21 contributed to the editing costs.

2. Follow-up research in 2024 and 2025

Lukas Pairon plans to return to Kinshasa for one month in 2024 and one month in 2025 to conduct further research with the young musicians who took part in his research from 2012 to 2016 - former members of violent gangs (kuluna) and young people formerly known as 'witch-children' and 'street children' (sheges) who have become musicians. During this further research he intends to revisit them and explore with them the role that learning music may have played in their lives - whether they remained musicians or not. The publisher Routledge New York hopes to be able to publish a new shortformat book on this further research in their 'focus titles' series.

We plan to also translate this new book into French. The Institute of Sociology at the University of Jena has decided to invite Lukas Pairon for the period 2024-2025 as a visiting scholar, enabling him to develop this post-doctoral research, accompanied by the sociologist Hartmut Rosa from this institute.

Biologist <u>Olivier Hamant</u>¹⁰ (INRAE, École Normale Supérieure, Lyon University) also decided to accompany this follow-up research.

3. 'Kinshasa Social & Musical' - the podcast

The book already mentions many of the people in Kinshasa who are developing these social projects through music, but Lukas Pairon is now also preparing to produce and broadcast a podcast in French, giving a real voice to these young people and to those who are developing these music projects with them in Kinshasa.

The podcast will be in French and will highlight how music is playing a major role in the social projects being studied in Kinshasa.

The projects featured in this podcast are <u>Music Fund</u> partner projects: the Espace Masolo¹¹ brass band (in Ndili-Messina, Kinshasa) and the Beta Mbonda¹² ensemble of percussionists (in Barumbu, Kinshasa) playing traditional Congolese music.

The project is twofold :

On the one hand, the ambition is to give a voice to Congolese working in this field and to learn from their experience. In the book and during the podcast we will not only find interviews with young Congolese who have become musicians and their music, but also with other people from Kinshasa who are familiar with this field of music and social work. During this programme, we will be looking for ways to get closer to the people of Kinshasa and the Congo, and we will be highlighting the usefulness of musical practice in social work, through the two socio-artistic projects studied between 2012 and 2016 and revisited in 2024-2025.

Music has a central place in the lives of the people of Kinshasa and the Congolese, and it can also play a role in social work which aims to help young people in difficulty to navigate towards constructive positions in society. We hope that our testimonies about the achievements of Beta Mbonda and Espace Masolo will have an impact - encouraging others to set up similar projects in Kinshasa and other towns in the DRC.

On the other hand, the podcast, and the book translated into French, will not only be designed for readers and listeners in Kinshasa and the DRC to discover these quality projects from home: socio-artistic music projects are developing enormously in a whole series of countries in the French-speaking world, in the north and in the south. The practitioners of such projects will also be the readers and listeners for whom this

book and podcast are intended - the musicians and social workers involved in social music projects outside the DRC.

Because podcasts can reach a wide audience, we intend to produce them in a very accessible, non-academic form. It will therefore be produced as a good radio programme: with ambient sound, the music of the young people themselves, of course the voices of the young musicians and a voice-over. The voice-over will help to compress and clarify certain parts. It could also be the researcher's voice, briefly elaborating on the results of the research and placing the interviews in a context (social and perhaps even theoretical). This will enrich the podcast.

Programme:

The French translation of the book should be available towards the end of 2025, and the podcast episodes should be available from the end of 2024 and during 2025.

Over the course of the multi-episode podcast, the following topics will be covered and discussed:

- 1. Kinshasa music omnipresent
- 2. Presentation of the brass band *Les Jeunes Talents* of Espace Masolo
- 3. Presentation of the percussion ensemble Beta Mbonda
- 4. Double accompaniment (artistic & social)
- 5. At the wheel mastering instruments and repertoire
- 6. Governance and internal democracy
- 7. Musical practice as an end in itself (pleasure of playing)
- 8. The art of 'positive fatalism' of young musicians in Kinshasa¹³
- 9. The art of *sharing* material and intellectual *property*

Podcast interviewees:

Preliminary experience:


